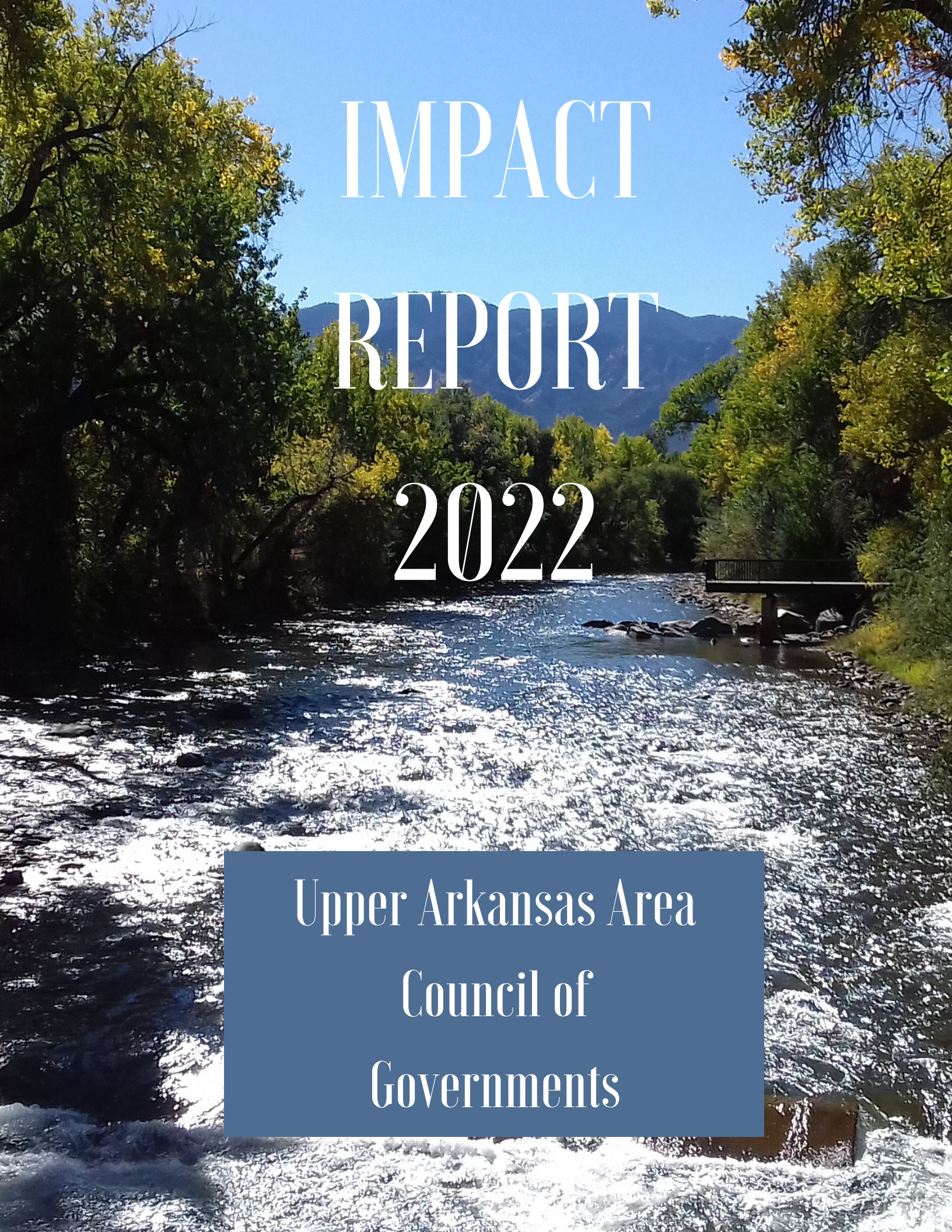
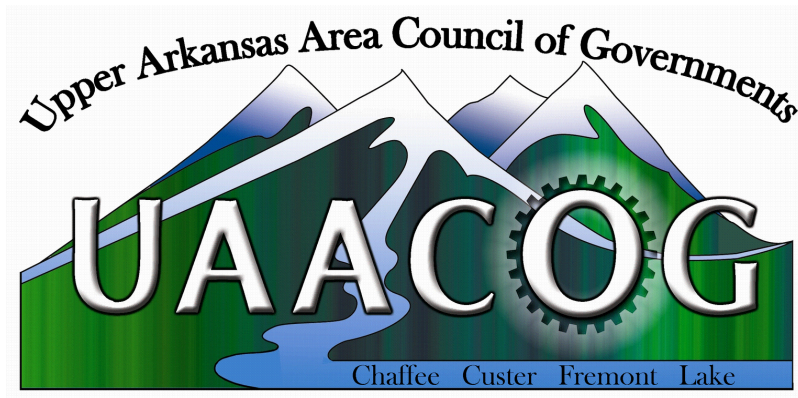

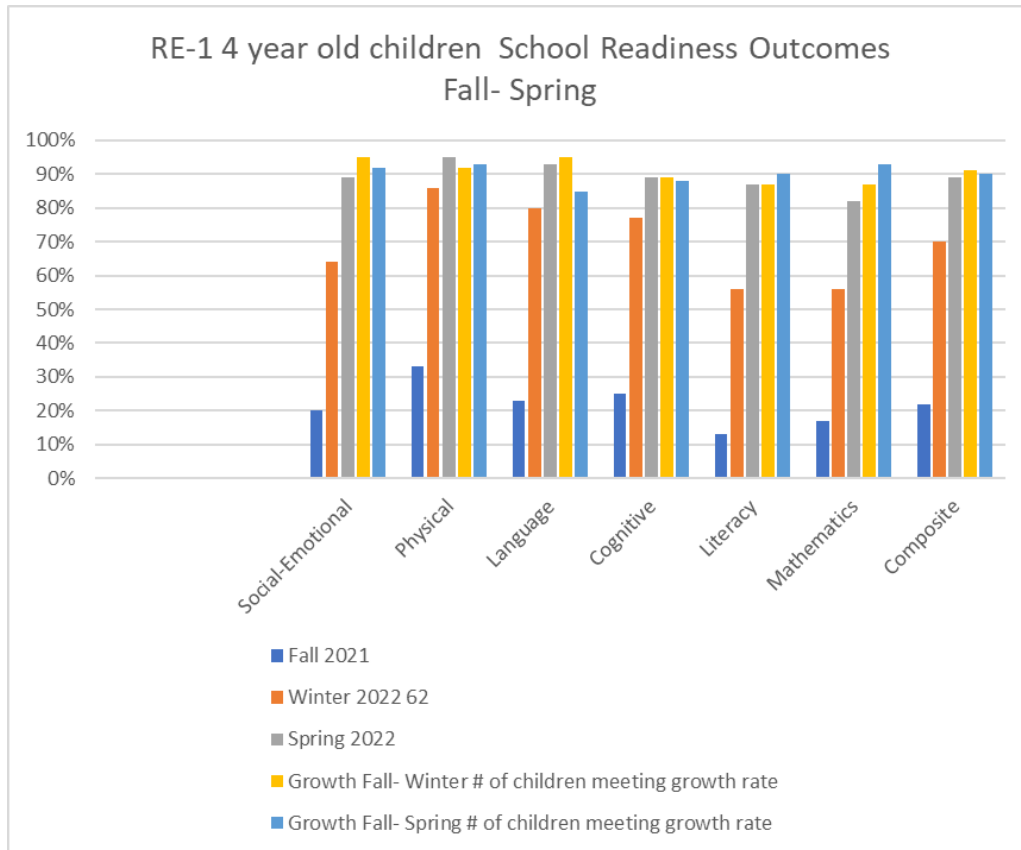

CSBG

The Community Service Block Grant (CSBG) is a federally funded program that helps alleviate the causes and conditions of poverty. We help with rent, mortgage, and utility payments as well as some medical, dental, car repair, and home repair costs. Currently, this program offers to income-qualified families a maximum grant of \$1000 once in five years paid directly to vendors.

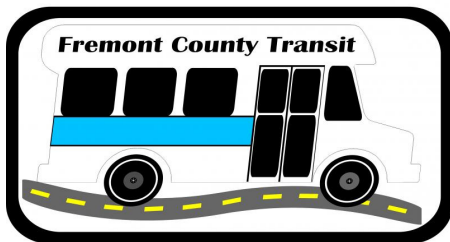

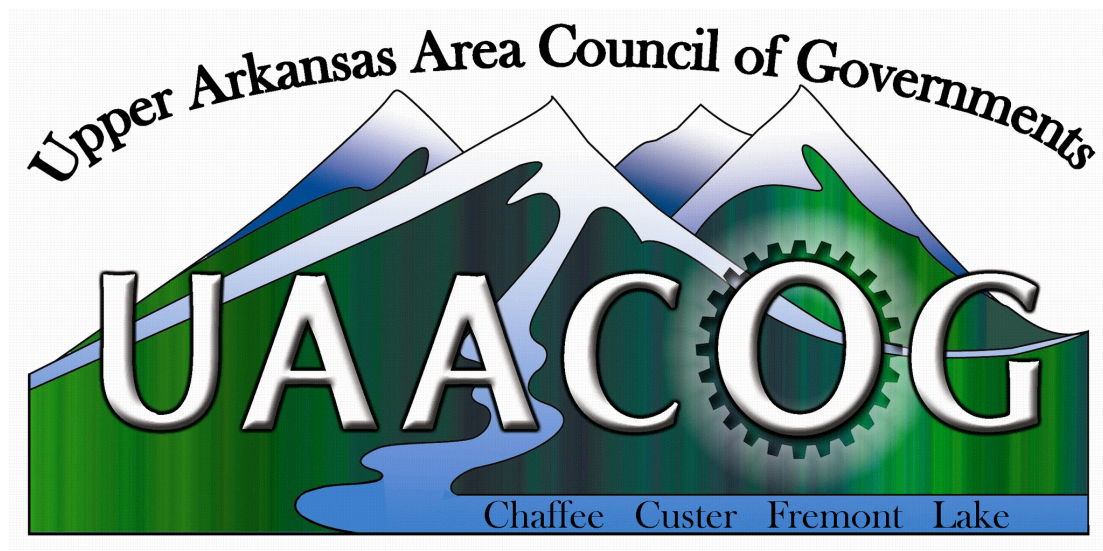
ECONOMIC IMPACT

SUMMARY OF ECONOMIC IMPACT OF UAACOG PROGRAMS

The varying programs and services of UAACOG contribute to the communities of the region in both tangible and intangible ways. The intangible ways are difficult to define but may be described as contributing to the community through participation, influence and heart. The tangible aspects can be evidenced through the economic impact to the communities. The following table contains a summary of the resources expended in the Upper Arkansas Region by community and category. The total Inkind contributions to UAACOG for 2022 was \$332,582.24 (decrease of \$20,659.38 from 2021) and the total direct payments made is shown below.
